"The Church is not a Wazungu Religion"

"Wazungu" is the Swahili word for "foreign white people." Here in Kenya, there are many who think that christianity is a "wazungu religion." Sure, a Maasai can follow Jesus: but he has to lose his Maasai-ness first. Absolutely, a Turkana can become a believer: but doing so surrenders his Turkana-ness.

But the Council of Jerusalem (see Acts 15), under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, settled that issue. We can become spiritual children of Abraham within our home cultures without becoming ethnic and cultural Israelites. Apart from Christ, I'm less than an American and my Maasai friends are less than Maasai. But in Jesus, we can find our true identities. A Maasai-in-Christ is more authentically

Maasai than any not-yet-believer, precisely because being in Christ means that you are becoming ever more authentically human.

With his blood, Jesus has redeemed for God people from "every tribe, tongue, people and nation" (Revelation 5.9).

Training church leaders ...

We've been busy since our last update. In October, some visitors from White River Christian Church (in Indiana) hosted a Sunday School Training Seminar out at Ewaso Ng'iro; all six of us went out to the training centre. I (Joshua) led a teachers' training seminar for the Narok congregation and then spent two weeks with our teammates in Turkana (in northwest Kenya) to teach at

Turkana Bible Training Institute (TBTI). I taught "Church History" and "Missions & Evangelism."

The TBTI students particularly appreciated the "Four Legs" analogy. Just as

the stool I'm perched upon has four legs, we can also say that the Church has "four legs": a translation of the scriptures in the local language, local church leadership (i.e., not being dependent on outsiders), a vision for mission, and prayer. If one of the legs is broken or missing, the Church will lack strength, life, and longevity.

It was after this course that three of the Turkana leaders thanked me because as a result of the course they realized that "the Church is not a *wazungu* religion. It has been in Africa since its beginning and has deep roots in African soil."

Ruth has begun writing a series of story-lessons for children. The star character is "Naiminayie the lost sheep." Work continues on the stewardship lessons and has begun on a curriculum on the Lord's Supper. This year Joshua is preparing to teach "History of Mission" for Mission Institute East Africa (MIEA, a CMF ministry).
